## March Field Trip - Disney Wilderness Preserve

On Saturday, March 20, 2004, our monthly field trip will be to the 12,000-acre Disney Wilderness Preserve in Osceola County. This is a magnificent property, which is owned and managed by The Nature Conservancy. We will hike at very leisurely pace for about 3 or 4 miles through the pine flatwoods ecosystem, which is comprised of fifteen different plant communities.

Bring binoculars, field guides, water, insect repellent, sun screen, head cover, lunch, wear your good hiking boots, and be

prepared for a wonderful walk in the great outdoors. We will bird until approximately noon and return to the Learning Center for a picnic lunch.

Meet in the parking lot across from the K-Mart at Sand Lake Road and Turkey Lake Road, just west of I-4, in south Orange County in time to sign up, get assigned to a carpool and leave at 7:30 am.

On February 21, 26 OAS members and guests enjoyed a wonderful morning at the Orlando Wetlands Park. We really got lucky! We had a total of 66 species. The bird of the day honors goes to the two Bald Eagle nestlings on the nest. It was quite a sight to see the two together, as this is quite unusual. A "life bird" for many people was the four Gull-billed Terns that put on quite a show for us and allowed us to get really good looks at

them. Other notable birds for the day include American Bittern, Black-crowned Night Heron, Mottled Duck, Cooper's Hawk, Peregrine Falcon, Sora, Purple Gallinule, Limpkin, Common Snipe and Purple Martin. After birding all morning, we had a very nice picnic lunch, complete with homemade brownies, at one of the pavilions.

All in all, it was a great place to be in the great outdoors with good birding friends.

## 16th Annual Chertok Nature Photography Contest

You are encouraged to enter Orange Audubon Society's 16th Annual (2004) Chertok Nature Photography Contest. The theme for 2004 is "Native Wildlife of Florida – Preserving Nature through Photography". This is a 35-mm slide competition, open to all ages. The subject matter must be native (to Florida) flora and/or fauna. Here is a fun, and possibly profitable, way to learn something about Florida's native plant and animal life and receive recognition for your photographic talent.

Cash prizes are \$125 for first place, \$75 for second place, and \$50 for third place. First through third place winners and those awarded an honorable mention also receive a ribbon and recognition in Orange Audubon Society's membership newsletter, OASis. First place winning slide will be featured on the cover of OAS' 2004-2005 brochure.

Deadline is May 20, 2004 for postmark or hand delivery of entries, with winners announced June 17, 2004 at OAS' annual potluck dinner and slide show presentation of contest entries. ## Orange Audubon Recognizes Outstanding Young Scientists

Two local students were named as this year's recipients of OAS' Special Award for the 2004 Dr. Nelson Ying Orange County Science Exposition that was held this past February 17-19, 2004 at the Central Florida Fairgrounds. This special award was for research that support efforts to improve the quality of our air, water, and habitat critical to humans, birds, and other wildlife.

"Study of the Effects of Petroleum Pollution on Groundwater in an Aquifer", by **Katrina Newman** was chosen as the most outstanding project in the junior category. Katrina used an model to investigate and quantify the possibility of seepage of com-

mon motor oil into the aquifer if dumped on a typical soil configuration. Her results indicated that even a small amount of oil can make its way down to the aquifer level to contaminate our drinking water supply and that education is critical to the public's understanding of water pollution. Katrina is a student at Gotha Middle School.

**Justin Patterson**, a student at Lake Highland Prep, was chosen as the recipient for the most outstanding project in the senior category. His project, "Removal of Non-Biodegradable Organics from Landfill Leachate" examined the possibility, feasibility, and effectiveness of on-site cyclical treatment of

leachate which is an inevitable by-product of our landfills. His results showed a definite promise for this new, original idea and Justin expressed a desire to further his research in this terribly important field by examining different compounds to treat the leachate.

Each award recipient received a prize consisting of a Certificate of Recognition, a year's membership to the Audubon Society, (National, Audubon of Florida, and Orange Audubon) as well as a cash prize of \$50. Congratulations to these promising young scientists for excellent research and presentations!

## FNPS Annual Conference in Orlando

The Tarflower Chapter of the Florida Native Plant Society will host the 24th Annual Conference this year in Orlando. The conference will be held at the Hotel Royal Plaza at Lake Buena Vista, May 13-16, 2004, and will offer an educational experience in understanding and preserving native flora and fauna.

With 400-500 attendees, the Annual Conference is the Society's biggest event. It features renowned speakers, field trips, and three concurrent seminar sessions. Seminar subjects range from the latest academic papers to butterfly gardening for beginners, and vendors will sell books, art, and native plants. There is always something for everyone.
