This Month's Program: February 21, 2008 - 7:00pm Fabulous Fish Hawks: The Ospreys of Pelican Island National Wildlife Refuge by Bob Montanaro

The Osprey is a familiar bird of prey to those of living in our lake- rich region of Central Florida. This raptor lives almost exclusively on live fish and makes dramatic dives from heights of 30 - 120 feet to plunge feet first into the water after their prey. Osprey nests of sticks and other material rest on power poles, bridges, buoys, and elevated platforms, as well as in trees.

For our February program Bob Montanaro, volunteer in the Osprey Watch program at Pelican Island National Wildlife Refuge, will provide an intimate look through still and video photography into the day-to-day activities of two pairs of nesting Ospreys. January Field Trip Report MARY KEIM, FIELD TRIP CHAIR

Twenty birders attended the January 19th field trip to Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge including five first-timers. The group saw at least 78 bird species including American White Pelican, American Bittern, Wood Stork, Glossy Ibis, Roseate Spoonbill, Northern Pintail, American Wigeon, Northern Shoveler, Lesser Scaup, Bald Eagle, Sora, Black-bellied Plover, Great Black-backed Gull, Bonaparte's Gull, Forster's Tern,

Caspian Tern, Black Skimmer, Tree Swallow, American Robin, and Common Yellowthroat.

While the cool, foggy morning gave us a slow start on butterflies, we saw Great Southern White, Cloudless Sulphur, Zebra Heliconian and Gulf Fritillary. Other animals seen included American Alligator, Florida Softshell, Florida Red-bellied Turtle, Green Anole, and Wild Hog.

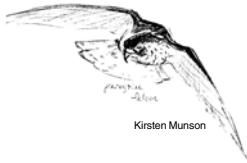

Bird of Prey ID Class Report

On January 12th, twenty-five birders, some from as far away as Spring Hill, Ocala, and The Villages, participated in the third Bird of Prey ID Class at the Lake Apopka Restoration Area. Nine species of raptors were seen and studied including: Sharp-shinned Hawk, lots of Red-shouldered and Red-tailed Hawks, American Kestrel, and an active Bald Eagle's nest. Other highlights: Black-crowned Night Heron, Long-billed Dowitcher, Western Kingbird, some rather large alligators, and a family of Bobcats. Lake Apopka Restoration Area Field Trip

On January 26th, fifteen birders, some from as far away as North Carolina and Panama City, enthusiastically endured a damp, chilly morning and a few rain showers to participate in OAS's annual Lake Apopka Restoration Area field trip. More than 80 species of birds were seen or heard within the property.

Additional birds seen afterwards by some of us along 448A and Ranch Rd. brought the grand total for the day to 90! Highlights included: an adult male Yellow-headed Blackbird; Black-crowned Night Heron; 9 species of duck with Gadwall, Green-winged Teal, Northern Shoveler, Am. Wigeon; 10 species of raptor with Sharp-shinned Hawk and numbers of eagles; Black-necked Stilt; Barn Owl; nesting Great-Horned Owl on 448A and Ranch Rd; Sedge and Marsh Wren; and Scrub Jay and the persistent Say's Phoebe on Ranch Road. A mother Black Bear and her cub, perhaps a first for the site, were the non-avian "wow!" of the day.

Count For Fun, Count For the Future!

This February 15-18th bird watchers all across North America will be participating in the 11th annual Great Backyard Bird Count- what about you? This popular hobby can be done from your yard, a city park, nature center, even your fire escape. Best of all, your actions truly make a difference as your count is included with thousands of others, helping science and conservation spotlight changes in bird populations and distribution from year to year.

Last year's count was a record-breaker. Citizen scientists across the United States and Canada counted more than 11 million birds and tallied 616 species, submitting 80,000 checklists, exceeding the previous record of 61,000 checklists in 2000 by 33 percent! The Northern Cardinal was once again the most frequently spotted bird, while American Robins were the most numerous species counted. Rare birds found during the 2007 GBBC included five Lesser Prairie-Chickens in Oklahoma and two Pink-footed Geese in Rhode Island – first records for the GBBC!
