# Field Trip - March 17, 2012 Rock Springs Run State Reserve, Sorrento

The Orange Audubon Society (OAS)-nominated Florida Special Place—Rock Springs Run State Reserve —will be the destination for our March field trip. With the diversity of habitats there, we will have a great day birding. This is also an opportunity to understand its importance as a key piece in the Wekiva River Basin properties with its underpass allowing bears to move from the Ocala National Forest into the Basin. We will begin at 8 a.m. Pay the \$3 per car entry fee at the entrance, and take the road to the left to the stables. Bathrooms are there, and we can carpool to our birding sites and return there for lunch. The easiest way to find Rock Springs Run State Reserve is to drive on SR-46 west towards Mt. Dora past the Wekiva River, approximately 7 miles west of I-4. Don't confuse this with Rock Springs at Kelly Parka separate location. This field trip is free and open to the public. # This Month's Program: March 15th @ 7 p.m. Red-cockaded Woodpeckers: Repopulating the Disney Wilderness Preserve by Jennifer Milikowsky

The Red-cockaded Woodpecker is a federally endangered species whose populations plummeted after extensive logging of longleaf pine throughout the South. This woodpecker is unusual in making its cavity in living pines, favoring older longleaf pines that have heart rot. The Disney Wilderness Preserve in Osceola County, owned and managed by the Nature Conservancy, has areas of old growth longleaf pines and has been a site for reintroduction of these woodpeckers. How does the process work? Is there potential to reintroduce this species to other areas in Central Florida?

For our March program, Jennifer Milikowsky, staff biologist at the Disney Wilderness Preserve, will use her excellent photography and expert knowledge to educate and enlighten us about this fascinating bird.

Please join us March 15th. Orange Audubon Society programs are free and open to the public. No reservations are necessary. Children are welcome.

# OAS' 2012 Nature Photo Contest Update

Orange Audubon Society's (OAS) 24<sup>th</sup> Annual Kit & Sidney Chertok Nature Photography Contest has a category to fit your skill level and a theme to allow participants to explore, photograph and learn more about the amazing native animals, plants, landscapes and habitats of Florida. Categories are: Amateur—for new and less experienced photographers; Advanced—for experienced nature photographers; and Youth—for participants age 17 and younger.

The theme for all categories is *Florida's Native Nature*. In this competition discernible non-*native* (to Florida) fauna and/or flora is not allowed. Similarly, discernible non-*nature* subject matter such as humans and human-made structures or artifacts is not allowed. The <u>Florida native nature</u> requirements are consistent with contest objectives of promoting interest and concern for preserving Florida's native wildlife and wild places and encouraging nature photography. There are *two* submission deadlines. The **final deadline** for all entries (*received by date*) is May 17, 2012. Images may be entered by the **optional early deadline** of April 19, 2012 (*received by date*) for a *free* pre-screening and a *free* do-over if they did not meet the <u>native</u>, <u>nature</u> and other contest criteria.

### **OAS Success Stories**

Orange Audubon Society (OAS) had a successful February with our special events. At the first annual Old Florida Outdoor Festival (Feb. 11–12) in Apopka, OAS volunteers — Bob Stamps, Dick Smith, Mary Keim, Randy Snyder, Michael Kay, Bob Sanders, Deborah Green, Cynthia Gosiewski, and Gallus Quigley — joined St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWMD) staff to conduct wildlife viewing bus tours on the Lake Apopka North Shore Restoration Area (LANSRA). The tour originated from the University of Florida's campus in Apopka. Over 170 people took the guided tours and saw alligators, coyotes, otters, Peregrine Falcons, Roseate Spoonbills, Bald Eagles, hawks, thousands of Blue-winged Teals, Black-necked Stilts and many other species. Comments were very favorable and participants were very excited about the bus tours. SJRWMD plans are to open part of the 17-mile long biking/hiking trail across the north shore from Orange to Lake County in April and later open the rest of that trail plus an additional 'Black Point Drive'-type auto trail on the property. However, the SJRWMD has received a request to 'swap' land that would allow the expansion of an airport adjacent to the LANSRA, which would affect current and future plans for management of the area for wildlife (see related article, page 5). Birds and airplanes do not play well together.

Meanwhile Cyndi Kay, Paul Luckett, Wayne Kennedy, Teresa Williams, Cynthia Goswieski, Margaret and Bill Cady and Loretta Satterthwaite were at the 'main event area' doing outreach for new members, selling our nature-oriented merchandise and signing more people up to participate in the bus tours. Saturday was a great day and we saw lots of 'traffic', but Sunday was very cold and, therefore, not so many were in attendance. However, we considered the event, which reportedly drew 15,000 attendees, very successful and look forward to participating again next year.

At the OAS co-sponsored 12<sup>th</sup> annual Orlando Wetlands Festival (Feb. 18) with 4,000 attendees, it was another beautiful and successful day for OAS. Our outreach, kids' art, and sales tables were tended by Cyndi Kay, Teresa Williams, Cynthia Gray, Wayne Kennedy, Paul Luckett, Cynthia and Robert Amoruso and Loretta Satterthwaite. Mary Keim and Randy Snyder also helped with display set-up and tear-down in our area, and Randy, OAS liaison for the event, coordinated the OAS-volunteers led bus tours and nature/bird hikes. # Annual Birdathon Fundraiser—Sunday, April 29<sup>th</sup>

Orange Audubon Society's (OAS) annual fundraising birdathon will be held on Sunday, April 29<sup>th</sup>. Birders may concentrate on one area (parks and uplands or seashores, etc.) or travel across the state to find those elusive birds that will increase the total number of species seen during that 24-hr period. OAS' goals are two-fold: 1) see lots of species that day and 2) get lots of pledges in support of the birdathon.

We are asking for your help. ### Fourteen bird boxes installed at Valencia West Campus

On February 10, Orange Audubon Society volunteers Richard Poole and Christine Brown helped about 25 eager Valencia College faculty and staff members to put up bird boxes on West Campus. This was part of a Learning Day Event involving volunteer work in the community (and on campus) in conjunction with local non-profit organizations. Construction Engineering Professor Andy Ray followed Richard's directions to purchase wood and cut the pieces. The volunteers assembled the boxes and put them up. There were 6 Wood Duck boxes (installed along Lake Pamela and the two retention ponds), 6 Great-Crested Flycatcher/Eastern Screech Owl boxes (installed on pines and palms near the lake and woods) and 2 Eastern Bluebird Boxes (installed on a split rail fence in an open field). ### Spring 2012 Beginners' Bird Watching Class Offered

Orange Audubon Society's (OAS) former board member Bob Sanders will teach a spring 2012 Beginners' Bird Watching Class (BBWC). Bob began OAS' successful Limited Edition field trips and Birds of Prey ID Classes while serving on the board; he has taught for the Elderhostel/Exploritas program "Beautiful Birds of Central Florida" and is an independent birding guide who has escorted US, Canadian and European visitors to some of Central Florida's best birding spots.

Enroll in the class to learn new skills or sharpen your existing ability to name bird species using sight, sound, behavior or a combination of these and other clues. The course includes a classroom session March 17<sup>th</sup> at Orlando Wetlands Park (with mini-field trip in the park) and 2 field sessions on March 24<sup>th</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup>; all sessions are 8:30 a.m.–12:30 p.m. Field session locales will be announced at the first class. Goals of the course are to increase knowledge and awareness of North American bird species; teach bird ID techniques, basic birding principles, bird habitat and anatomy; provide binocular basics and tips on using field guides and checklists; and discuss birding ethics.

Registration is required and class is limited to 20 students. Total cost for all three sessions is \$30 for Audubon members, \$45 for non-members and \$10 for children through age 12 with a registered adult, payable by check or money order to Orange Audubon Society. Non-members can join when registering and pay \$50 (\$45 for students), which includes BBWC registration (member price \$30) plus introductory 3-way annual membership in OAS, National Audubon Society and Audubon of Florida [promotional rate \$20 (students \$15)]. ### Lake Apopka North Shore Restoration Area In Jeopardy

The St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWMD) has received a request to 'swap' several hundreds of acres of taxpayer land for about 100 acres of privately owned farmland in order to allow the expansion of an airport adjacent to the Lake Apopka North Shore Restoration Area (LANSRA). This seemingly innocuous plan to swap one parcel of land for another along the north edge of the LANSRA could lead to disastrous effects. The land swap would allow the construction of a mile-long runway next to the North Shore Restoration Area; a plan foolhardy at its best since we all know what happens when airplanes and other flying objects (i.e. any of the plentiful birds now occupying the restoration area) encounter each other. To make matters worse, if this larger runway is built, it would accommodate the types of planes that the airport owners are hoping for (business jets), but the Federal Aviation Administration could now get involved with the management by not only imposing a 10,000-foot exclusion area around the runway but also other rules that would effectively override the SJRWMD's current management of the area for improving wildlife habitat and increasing bird populations by preventing the district from obtaining needed federal permits or grants.

Please act today to let the SJRWMD Executive Director Hans G. Tanzler, III; the SJRWMD Governing Board and relevant staff members (Robert Christianson, David Walker and Gian Basili); Governor Rick Scott; Department of Environmental Protection Secretary Herschel Vinyard, Jr.; and local newspapers and news channels know that you and other environmentalists oppose this land swap because it would undermine the taxpayer-funded restoration efforts of Lake Apopka and its surrounding area and it would endanger more than 300 bird species that roost and/or forage on the north shore restoration area.
