This Month's Program April 19th @ 7 p.m. **Shore Nesting Birds: Audubon Florida's Conservation Efforts by Marianne Korosy**

Beach-nesting birds-including terns, willets, plovers, black skimmers and oystercatchers—don't build nests in the traditional sense. They dig shallow scrapes in the sand using camouflage for protection from predators. But these nearly invisible nests are easy to destroy unintentionally. Intrusions by people or pets may cause the birds to fly off, leaving eggs or chicks in peril in the blazing hot sun. Audubon of Florida has a key effort in stewardship and other programs to protect shore nesting birds. For our April program, Marianne Korosy, an ornithologist leading the shorebird conservation effort for Audubon Florida, will share what is being done and what we can do to protect these birds, some of which even nest inland.

Join us April 19 for what will be a most and enjoyable program. interesting Audubon Society (OAS) programs are free and no reservations are necessary. All ages are welcome, including young naturalists.

Annual Birdathon Fundraiser—Sunday, April 29th

From 12:01 a.m. to 12:00 midnight on April 29th, Orange Audubon Society's (OAS) teams and individuals will fan out to see as many species of birds as they can as we try to reach our annual goal of 200 species. Last year, because it was very cold and there was even snow in some places in Florida, we fell far short of that goal and only saw 133 species. The previous year, I think we had our all-time high of 189 species. Cochair Gallus is out to top his record for bird species seen in Lake County on one day, so he challenges you to try to see more species than he does. He's taking his non-birding girlfriend along as his handicap (his words, not mine!). If you beat him, I'll see that you get one of his infamous 'birder' bumper stickers as a prize. If you want to take up his challenge, you may concentrate on one area (parks and uplands or seashores, etc.) or travel across the state to find those elusive birds that will increase your total number of species seen during that 24-hr period. (If you plan to bird, please contact Loretta—see information at end of article—about where you plan to bird and how to report your species seen.)

OAS' goals are two-fold: 1) see lots of species that day and 2) get lots of pledges in support of the birdathon. You can definitely help with goal #2. This is OAS' 'Girl Scout Cookies', or 'walkathon'; don't be shy about asking your co-workers, vet, dentist, doctor, neighbor, etc. to support <u>our</u> efforts to raise funds that will be used in the Central Florida area for conservation/education. Try to get pledges (5¢, 10¢, 25¢, 50¢, \$1 or any amount per species seen or a flat contribution of \$5, \$10 or any other amount) from at least 3 people. When we tally the number of species, we'll let you know and you collect the money from your pledged supporters and turn it in to OAS. How simple is that? Genius Drive Nature Preserve Survey-Birdathon Field Trip

Reservations are required for a guided field trip to the 48± acre Genius Drive Nature Preserve in Winter Park on April 29th from 8 a.m. ~ Noon. This walking field trip (FT) will be concurrent with a migration bird survey led by preeminent birder, Bruce Anderson. Surveyors and field trip participants will form a 'team' to compete with other teams that day in counting species for Orange Audubon Society's (OAS) 2012 Birdathon fund raiser. Your good birding and/or observation skills will give this team the advantage!

The field trip is FREE. Although you are not required to do so, please consider soliciting one Birdathon donation from a friend, family member or that relentless neighbor whose child is forever selling gift wrap or cookies for their fund raisers!

Just as Winter Park was once a winter home for northerners, the Preserve has remained an essential winter home to many bird species and an ecological stepping stone for migrating birds. We will see some of them on this spring migration survey.

In just five years, surveyors have documented 164 bird species on the Preserve, which is also rich in 19th century history. The citrus groves and meandering Genius Drive with its hedges of shell ginger and Turk's cap were planted and constructed by Charles Hosmer Morse, the museum's namesake. The original Wind Song estate built in 1936 by Elizabeth Morse Genius still looks across Lake Virginia to Rollins College.

We saw species including Wood Storks, Great Egrets, Snowy Egrets, Green Herons, Little Blue Herons, Tri-colored Herons, Red Shouldered Hawks, American Bald Eagle, American Coots, Limpkins, Purple Gallinules, Tree Swallows, Mottled Ducks, Shovelers, Blue Winged Teals, and Black Bellied Whistling Ducks, to name a few. There were newly hatched gators as well, and thanks to soaking rains the preceding night, we were able to track many species, including a very busy Bobcat. If you were out at the Wetlands Park that day, and came upon tracks that were labeled and identified in the dirt, thank Shannon.

February Limited Edition Field Trip Report

It was a "good news, bad news" situation for the Feb. 25th Limited Edition Field Trip planned for the Shiloh Marsh Rd. area of Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge. The "bad news": because of disrepair, Shiloh Marsh Rd. has been closed until further notice. This necessitated a "Plan B" that led to much "good news". The field trip was sold out - 15 birders. As an alternative to Shiloh, I decided to explore Gator Creek Rd., another refuge road less traveled. WOW! How fortunate! It began and ended with some spectacular sightings, despite the windy conditions. To begin with we easily located the reported drake Cinnamon Teal, an extremely beautiful creature rare in Florida, in with 100s of other waterfowl.

Several hours later, at the end of our trip, we were treated to an incredible display of aerobatics as an adult Peregrine Falcon swooped in on a group of Laughing and Ring-billed Gulls. In between, we saw huge rafts of American Coots, 1000s of shorebirds, White Pelicans, Roseate Spoonbills, Reddish Egrets, and several Bald Eagles - 70 species in all. 
