OAS Field Trip Saturday, January 19th Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge

Orange Audubon Society (OAS) will travel to Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge (Black Point Drive and surrounding areas) for our January field trip on Saturday, January 19th. Black Point Drive is always exciting with lots of shorebirds, waders and duck species. Bring binoculars, spotting scopes, field guides and sunscreen. Also be sure to bring lunch, snacks and drinks. Limited Edition Field Trip – Saturday, Jan. 26th Lake Apopka North Shore Restoration Area

The Lake Apopka Restoration Area (LARA) is potentially one of the most important birding destinations in all of Florida. The numbers of birds and the variety of species can be simply amazing. Because of ongoing restoration work much of LARA is closed. Birders are encouraged to take advantage of this rare opportunity to explore currently restricted portions of this important place. We can expect to find wintering raptors, waterfowl, waders, sparrows, etc.

Orange Audubon Society's Overnight Field Trip BIRDING IN SARASOTA—JAN 11–12, 2013—THE CELERY FIELDS

Birders have flocked to this wildlife preserve just east of I-75 and south of Fruitville Road for years. Sarasota County bought the farmland in 1992 as part of a wetlands project and in 2011, reshaped the park for recreational use. Shell trails wrap around Observation Hill, where walkers, joggers and bikers enjoy climbing the trails to the top of the 75-foot mound in addition to 300 acres of varied terrain.

According to the Sarasota Audubon, the location of the site, the large number of diverse bird species, and its public ownership by Sarasota County make the Celery Fields an ideal location for wildlife watching. There is a field trip fee of \$10 per person/Audubon members and \$15 per person/non-Audubon members payable to Orange Audubon Society. Participants should make their own hotel reservations. Florida's Water and Land Conservation Amendment: Please Sign the Petition

Orange Audubon Society has joined a statewide environmental coalition working to put a new amendment onto the 2014 state ballot to create stable long-term funding for conservation and restoration. Statewide we need 500,000 signatures.

Florida Forever, its predecessor Preservation 2000, and earlier land buying programs from the 1970s and 1980s protected over 2.4 million acres of critical water resources, natural areas, wildlife habitat, parks, greenways, and trails throughout Florida. The money came from a portion of the documentary stamp taxes ("Doc stamps," which are fees on real estate transactions) as well as through bond sales. Since 2009, funding has been basically eliminated, and many wetlands, beaches, springs and other vital natural areas remain unprotected. Through this amendment one-third of the existing "Doc stamps" would fund water and land conservation, management, and restoration, providing an estimated \$5 billion for conservation in Florida over the next ten years and \$10 billion over the twenty-year life of the amendment.

Please help by signing the petition at our meeting or at any of our events. Note that you must sign exactly as your name appears on your voter registration card, so please check this in advance. OAS Special Event Photography Workshop – Saturday, February 2, 2013 by Robert Amoruso at Orlando Wetlands Park

Award winning bird and nature photographer Robert Amoruso is presenting an in-the-field and in-theclassroom Photography Workshop as a Special Fundraiser for Orange Audubon Society on February 2, 2013 at Orlando Wetlands Park (OWP) near Christmas, Florida. Robert, a renowned and well respected photographer and teacher, is presenting this workshop to complement the OAS's Kit and Sidney Chertok Florida Native Nature Photography Contest. If you've ever wanted to know how to move your images from ordinary to extraordinary, this is the workshop for you. Robert will cover topics such as composition, visual design and dynamics, understanding light and how it affects your photography and more.

The setting at Orlando Wetlands Park provides opportunities for beautiful sunrise images, so the workshop will get underway at 6:00 a.m. After spending time in the field capturing images, the workshop moves to the OWP education center for a question and answer session, and a slide program to emphasize the topics covered in the field, and a session on what constitutes a winning image from a judge's perspective. Participants should have a good working knowledge of digital SLR photography.

The in-the-field portion of the workshop is hands-on, so bring your photography equipment. The indoor sessions does not require a computer and the presentations will be given to you on a CD.

Photography Workshop 101 - Backgrounds

In conjunction with our Photography Workshop at the Orlando Wetlands Park February 2nd and the OAS Chertok Native Nature Photography Contest (see Calendar of Events), this is the second in an ongoing series of helpful how-to articles to improve your nature photography.

In October we talked about how background influences your exposures. In this segment we talk about how background influences your compositions. My personal style of wildlife photography is to set the subject apart from the background or to provide a background void of distractions, and I don't mean cloning it out in Photoshop later. Some backgrounds provide a pristine palette upon which you can paint – such as water (see Bufflehead Duck image below left) and sky (see Great Blue Heron image below middle). For an American Bittern, obtaining a "clean" background is difficult. In those instances I'll search for the bittern in a pleasing display of uniform grass as is the case below right. The vertical-pointing grass does not grab the viewer's attention as a thicket of tangled brush would.

Use shallow depth of field (large aperture) to make backgrounds soft (out of focus). Put yourself on the same

level as the subject (lower point of view), placing the background further away thus making it softer. The added benefit is a lower view point will enhance your connectivity with the subject.

Orange Audubon Society offers Florida Master Naturalist Program Scholarships

For the second year, Orange Audubon Society (OAS) is pleased to offer two scholarships for environmental educators and/or volunteers in Central Florida to pay ½ of the \$225 tuition to attend a Florida Master Naturalist Program (FMNP) Core Module class (Freshwater Wetlands, Coastal Systems or Upland Habitats). FMNP is an adult education program developed by the University of Florida. The mission of the program is to promote awareness, understanding, and respect of Florida's natural world. Scholarship applicants must be OAS members and reside in Central Florida. New memberships are welcome in order to apply. Current board members and scholarship committee members are ineligible to apply. Each scholarship recipient is strongly encouraged to complete a course-related project (such as a brochure or display or slide show) and present it to a local school class, civic group, park or other group to help fulfill Orange Audubon Society's environmental educational mission. Last year's winners, Jutta and Reinhard Geisler, have now completed the Master Naturalist program and have presented bird programs and regularly lead tours at Orlando Wetlands Park, a park that OAS partners with regarding the Orlando Wetlands Festival. Jutta is also the webmaster for the citizen support group Friends of the Orlando Wetlands. At least five other OAS members have taken FMNP courses to help them with their environmental education efforts.

The scholarship committee will notify the winners no later than February 15th, 2013. The two winners will then be reimbursed \$112.50 each following OAS's receipt of proof of completion of an FMNP module class.
