Dear Orange Audubon Member and Friend:

Orange Audubon Society Field Trip Saturday, February 23rd *Ferndale Preserve*

Orange Audubon travels west to Ferndale Preserve for our February field trip. On Saturday, February 23rd at 8:30 a.m. we meet in the parking lot of the preserve. From there, birders will hike along a 1.3-mile loop and a few shorter segments (warning: the trail has some steep portions). The preserve is a former orange grove, which is being restored to Longleaf Pine, Wiregrass, Xeric Scrub and meadow ecosystems. It offers nature lovers lots to enjoy with more than 140 birds, 40 butterflies, and numerous other animals including: the Pine Snake, Gopher Tortoise, Bobcat, River Otter, American Alligator, Box Turtle and Fence Lizard. It is also home to many native plants including an endangered tree species. Birds of interest include sparrows, raptors, and winter visitors common to the Lake Apopka area. Restrooms are on site.

Please bring a picnic lunch to enjoy after birding. The preserve is a short drive from Orlando along the west shore of Lake Apopka, north of Montverde (19220 County Road 455 Ferndale, FL). For more information, please call John Cento at (407) 913-2417, and he will be happy to answer your questions.

Limited Edition Field Trip – Sunday, Feb. 17th Three Lakes Wildlife Management Area

Located south of St. Cloud in the wilds of Osceola County, the Three lakes Wildlife Management Area and nearby Joe Overstreet Road offer unique birding opportunities. Florida is home to more Bald Eagles than any other state outside of Alaska and this region may hold more Bald Eagles than any other area in Florida. Other species found here include: Redcockaded Woodpecker, Snail Kite, Bachman's Sparrow, White-tailed Kite, Crested Caracara, Sandhill Cranes and occasionally Whooping Cranes. Although we may not see them, Three Lakes is an important habitat for the nearly extinct Florida Grasshopper Sparrow.

This trip is limited to 15 people and costs \$10 per person for members and \$15 per person for nonmembers. Reservations are required and will be taken on a first-come, first-served basis the week prior to the trip. For trip questions or reservations call Bob Sanders at 407-454-0542. Florida's Land and Water!!

Let's get to work! Audubon (state and local chapters) is committed to getting the Florida Water and Land Legacy Amendment on the ballot for 2014. This initiative would not involve any new taxes, instead designating monies that were previously used to acquire, restore, improve and manage



conservation lands under the Preservation 2000 and Forever Florida campaigns be once again designated for that purpose.

In order to get the amendment on the ballot, we still need over 600,000 signatures on petitions by the end of November 2013. Please consider helping to procure these signatures by getting petitions (volunteer on line at http://floridawaterlandlegacy.org or visit the Audubon Center for Birds of Prey in Maitland and pick up 25–50 petitions, for a start) then take these petitions to your place of worship (whether it be a church, synagogue, or campground!), your work place or any other location where you meet up with individuals or groups who are registered Florida voters. We must get away from our usual conservation-oriented gatherings and tap into the vast near-Orlando population. We can do this; we <u>must</u> do this. Governor Scott has already tested the waters for selling off our state parks and instructed our water management districts to conduct studies with the goal of surplussing our state lands; we should not leave it to the elected officials to deal with our state lands in a manner that depends on which way the political wind is blowing in any particular year. Spring 2013 Beginners' Bird Watching Class Offered

Orange Audubon Society's (OAS) very own Bob Sanders will teach a Beginner's Bird Watching Class (BBWC) this spring. Bob originated OAS' popular Limited Edition field trips and Birds of Prey ID Classes while serving on the board; he has taught for the Elderhostel/Exploritas program "Beautiful Birds of Central Florida" and is an independent birding guide who has escorted US, Canadian and European visitors to some of Central Florida's best birding spots.

The class is intended to teach or enhance skills in naming bird species using sight, sound, behavior and other clues. The course includes a classroom session March 9th at Orlando Wetlands Park (with mini-field trip in the park) and 2 field sessions on March 16th and 23rd; all sessions are 8:30 a.m.–12:30 p.m. Field session locales will be announced at the first class. Goals of the course are to increase knowledge and awareness of North American bird species; teach bird ID techniques, basic birding principles, bird habitat and anatomy; discuss birding ethics; and provide binocular basics (OAS 'loaner' binoculars available during class) and tips on using field guides and checklists.

Registration is required and class is limited to 20 students. Total cost for all three sessions is \$30 for Audubon members, \$45 for non-members and \$10 for children through age 12 with a registered adult, payable to Orange Audubon Society. Non-members can join when registering and pay \$50, which includes BBWC registration (member price \$30) plus introductory 3-way annual membership in OAS, National Audubon Society and Audubon Florida (\$20 promotional rate). The History of OAS's "Chertok Nature Photography Contest"

This year marks the 25th anniversary for Orange Audubon Society's (OAS) Florida native nature photography contest. The first contest was announced in the January 1989 *OASis* and the theme was *Florida Birds*. In that first contest, the winners included some familiar names: Audrey Kirschner, Jeffrey Stahl and Bob Stamps received 1st, 2nd and 3rd places, respectively, while honorable mentions went to Mary Keim, Randy Snyder, and John Winfree; special artistic merit awards went to Barbara Brand and William Alt.

At that time, the contest was named the OAS' Sidney L. Chertok Memorial Nature Photography Contest because upon his death, Mrs. Chertok (Kit) asked that memorials in his honor be sent to Orange Audubon Society. The Board of Directors wanted to do something special with those funds so a committee was formed to consider alternatives, which were presented to Kit for her input. Because her husband had been very interested in photography, especially nature photography, and for 34 years had edited a photograph-filled engagement calendar featuring images solicited by competition from area photographers, she chose the idea of an OAS photography contest to encourage others to carry on nature photography.

Kit became a great friend of OAS. She served on the OAS Board of Directors from Nov 1992 through June 1995; during that time, Kit encouraged OAS to also sponsor a Kids' photo (prints) contest. Not only did Kit provide supporting funds for the annual photo contest(s), but she also suggested in 1994 that OAS sell some nature-oriented t-shirts as a fundraising effort (boy, did she create a monster!!). Although Kit moved to South Florida to be closer to her daughter for personal health reasons, she remained in close contact with OAS and attended most of the awards presentations until 2001. After her death in 2003, in her honor, in 2006 the photography contest was renamed the OAS' Kit & Sidney Chertok Open Nature Photography Contest.

Starting with the 2nd annual photo contest in 1990, OAS has presented the annual Chertok Photo Contest & Awards night as its June program each year. Over the years, the annual photo contest has gained more exposure and participation (hundreds of entries) and the June meeting has become a huge success. We fully expect the same performance at the June 20th meeting when we celebrate the entries and present awards for this silver anniversary contest. If you haven't already taken your photographs depicting *Florida's Creatures and Features*, get snappin'!! and send in your entry form. Deadline for early entry with a FREE do-over option if your entry doesn't meet all the contest requirements is April 18th and final entry deadline is May 16th (received by dates). Florida Master Naturalist Program Freshwater Wetlands Class at Orlando Wetlands Park

The Florida Master Naturalist Program (FMNP) is an adult education UF/IFAS Extension program

developed by the University of Florida. FMNP training will benefit persons interested in learning more about Florida's environment or wishing to increase their knowledge for use in education programs as volunteers, employees, ecotourism guides, and others. The FMNP consists of three Core Modules: Freshwater Wetlands, Coastal Systems and Upland Habitats. Each Module is 40 contact hours of classroom learning, field trips, and practical experience. Each Module is \$225 and includes detailed course manuals and, upon completion, FMNP certificates, patches, and pins.



The Freshwater Wetlands Module is being offered at the Orlando Wetlands Park on Tuesdays, February 26, 2013 through April 2, 2013. A night tour of the Park will be held
