This Month's Program: Mar. 21st @ 7:00 p.m. The Trouble with Turtles: Protecting Sea Turtles at Canaveral National Seashore by John Stiner

Canaveral National Seashore covers 57,000 acres (24 miles) of undeveloped beach, the longest such stretch on the east coast of Florida. Thirteen federally listed threatened and endangered species make their home within Canaveral's boundaries, including sea turtles, who nest on its shores. Loggerhead turtles are the most prevalent, next are Green turtles, and Leatherbacks, the largest sea turtle species. Less common are Kemp's Ridley and Hawksbill turtles. In 2012, nearly 6000 turtle nests were counted on the Seashore. Mosquito Lagoon, 21,000 acres of which is protected as part of Merritt Island National Wildlife refuge, is situated behind the barrier island, and is an important nursery site for juvenile sea turtles. Turtles are in peril along our coast and worldwide.

John Stiner, Resource Management Specialist at Canaveral National Seashore, will present some of the issues, challenges and rewards of managing these ancient, mysterious creatures. Join us on Thursday, March 21st and also learn how you can become involved "up close and personal" in protecting sea turtles at the Seashore.

Orange Audubon Society Field Trip Saturday, March 23rd Viera Wetlands/Click Ponds with Lori Mathis

Viera is always a good spot for many wading birds, duck species and raptors. This should be a driving trip, however, there is the possibility that Viera will be closed to vehicular traffic. We will be able to drive the Click Ponds, but please be prepared for some possible hiking in the Wetlands. Bring binoculars, spotting scopes, field guides and sunscreen. Also be sure to bring lunch, snacks and drinks.

The Celery Fields Birding Trip Report

A huge shout out to Jeanne Dubi, President of Sarasota Audubon Society, for leading our group of Orange Audubon Society (OAS) members on Saturday, 1/12/2013. We met at Ackerman Lake in the Celery Fields and not a minute was wasted as we started our bird species count looking out to the lake, then crossing the road to view the North-West Cell body of water. We formed an auto caravan and drove to Raymond Road to walk out on a new 100-yard pier for viewing the South-West Cell of water, then walked out on a man-made Grass Berm Trail for about 200 yards to view both the South-East and South-West Cells. Jumping back into our autos, we went to the Gazebo at the base of the man-made 'Mound' where 5 miles of trails begin. This site will soon be the location of The Audubon Nature Center that will display details of the 400 acre-area; boasting 210 species of birds, including 15 breeders. We then crossed the road and walked onto a second pier for closer viewing of the South-East Cell of water. Finally, we drove to the Founders Club Pond on Fruitville Road. Our official Checklist of Birds of Sarasota County verified our group count to be 54 species of birds. For me personally, I added 11 new species to my lifetime list of Birds of North America.

After the morning of birding, we all (including Jeanne Dubi) met for a great lunch at the Old Packing House Cafe to revisit our day in the field. *Paul Luckett, OAS Coordinator*

Annual Birdathon Fundraiser—Sunday, April 28th

Orange Audubon Society's (OAS) annual fundraising birdathon will be held on Sunday, April 28th. On that day, birders (teams or individuals) will spend the entire day striving to identify as many bird species as possible. Birders may concentrate on one area (parks and uplands or seashores, etc.) or travel across the state to find those elusive birds that will increase the total number of species seen during that 24-hr period. OAS' goals are twofold: 1) see lots of species that day (our goal is still that elusive 200 species!) and 2) get lots of pledges in support of the birdathon.

We are asking for your help. Join or lead a team of birders (contact Loretta at 407-886-2925 or <u>LNS-oas@att.net</u> to volunteer) and/or ask for pledges (5¢, 10¢, 25¢, 50¢, \$1 or any amount per species seen or a flat contribution of \$5, \$10 or any other amount). When we tally the number of species, we'll let you know and you collect the money for OAS from your pledgers. This is OAS' 'Girl Scout Cookies', or 'walkathon'; don't be shy about asking your co-workers, vet, dentist, doctor, neighbor, etc. to support <u>our</u> efforts to raise funds that will be used in the Central Florida area for conservation or education. 
Genius Preserve Workday Planned
