Teams fanned out to various locations in

Central Florida, but also visited Ft. DeSoto, Three Lakes Wildlife Management Area and the Florida Keys. Our total for the day was 166 species. It's a fun day, so plan to join a team next year and help OAS reach that elusive goal of 200 species!

May Field Trip Report

Fifteen attended the OAS field trip to the Joshua Creek Trailhead of Charles H. Bronson State Forest on May 17th. The weather was pleasantly cool.

The group observed 26 bird species including Wild Turkey, Red-shouldered Hawk, Great Crested Flycatcher, White-eyed Vireo, Eastern Bluebird, Northern Parula, Pine Warbler, Eastern Towhee and Bachman's Sparrow. Invertebrates included Ebony Jewelwing (at Joshua and Buscombe Creeks; one attracted to hats), Pipevine Swallowtail (caterpillar on Virginia Snakeroot; fresh adult next to empty chrysalis; mated pair), Zebra Swallowtail and Yellowjacket Hover Fly.

Wildflowers in bloom included Saw Palmetto, Southern Magnolia, Loblolly Bay, Spurred Butterfly Pea, Blackroot, Florida Greeneyes and Black-eyed Susan. The group observed fruits of Sweetgum, Shiny Blueberry, and Netted Pawpaw. We noted ecotones as we dropped in elevation from sandhill into pine flatwoods and pine flatwoods into hardwood hammock.

Thanks to all who have attended field trips this year. See you in September!

Bird-Friendly Yards 201

Do you have a yard that is extremely bird-friendly? For instance, do you get Painted Buntings in winter? Have you had visits by hummingbirds besides the Ruby-Throated Hummingbird? Do you have breeding Carolina Chickadees, Northern Parulas, and/or Eastern Bluebirds? Does an Ovenbird overwinter in your yard? Do you have Eastern Screech Owls? Do Chimney Swifts breed in your chimney?

Because a picture is worth a thousand words, the Bird-friendly Yards 201 project is to accumulate photos and tips from OAS members with exceptionally bird-friendly yards. Some Audubon Chapters actually organize tours of these yards, and that's something to work towards. A first step is just identifying the yards and getting some basic photos. You don't have to have a good photo but let us know what rarer birds you have and do start photographing your yard throughout the seasons.

Central Florida Butterfly Identification Workshop on October 11th, 2014

Orange Audubon Society is offering a fall Butterfly Identification Workshop. The 8-hour workshop is Saturday, October 11th, from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. with a short lunch break. The workshop involves slide presentations, field observation and identification of butterflies at Orlando Wetlands Park (OWP) and nearby Seminole Ranch Conservation Area in east Orange County. Slide presentations will be held in the OWP Education Center on Wheeler Road in Christmas, FL.

Recommended field guide is Butterflies through Binoculars: Florida by Glassberg, Minno, and Calhoun, 2000, Oxford. Close-focusing binoculars are helpful and will be available for use during the workshop. Instructors are Orange Audubon members Randy Snyder and Mary Keim. If you have questions about workshop content, contact Randy and Mary at rssmhk@gmail.com or (407) 851-5416). Participants should bring drink, lunch and wear appropriate field attire including close-toed shoes you don't mind getting wet.

Registration is required. Cost is \$25 for Audubon members; \$40 for non-members; and \$10 for children 12 or younger (must be accompanied by a registered adult), payable by check or money order to Orange Audubon Society. Non-members can join when registering and pay \$45, which includes butterfly workshop registration (member price \$25) plus introductory 3-way annual membership in the Orange, National and Florida Audubon Societies (\$20 promotional rate).
